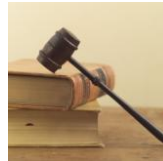

This drop box can be used for Dale Sanitary payments, Dog Licenses, Tax payments, CSM papers, and any other paperwork that needs to be delivered to town officials.

**Letter from Andrew Gitter  
District 34 Supervisor, Outagamie County---**

The number one issue of concern for Outagamie County has been the budget. Budget reviews begin in October, with final budget approval in November. Earlier this year County Executive, Toby Paltzer requested that all departments come up with ways to trim their existing budgets. He also set 2010 target budget reductions for each department. One initiative; unpaid volunteer staff time off, has saved the county approx. 40,000 dollars year to date. All of these measures are in response to a decline in revenue from the state and the current economy. While the state continues to mandate programs, the funding for many of these programs is being cut at the state level. This presents some difficult challenges for all counties in the state. Recently the County Board voted no to appointing a committee to review a county sales tax option. Outagamie is among a small number of counties in the state that have yet to enact a sales tax. Reports from the Finance Department indicate that while Outagamie County will face some difficult fiscal challenges, they are in better shape than many counties in the state. The task of providing a balanced budget with minimal impact to tax payers, while serving the needs of county residents, lies ahead. **BURNING PERMITS** are required in the Town of Dale beginning April 1<sup>st</sup> thru Nov. 1<sup>st</sup>. Permits are available from Jim Emmons, The Town Chairperson, or any board Supervisor. Failure to obtain a permit could result in a fine plus the expenses of the fire run, if your fire is called in to 911 dispatch. Because of the law, the clerk and treasurer are unable to issue a permit.

**BUILDING PERMITS** *are required before starting any building or remodeling project with a total value of \$2,000.00 or more. This amount includes cost of material and cost of labor (even if you do your own work). Permits are available from Building Inspector Jim Emmons at 779-6810.*

## **MEDICAL EMERGENCIES**

### **OUTAGAMIE COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPT.**

What you need to know when you have an emergency. The first thing you should do is dial 911. Questions that may be asked are: Where do you need help? What is the emergency? Do you need police, fire or ambulance services? These questions are asked while other personnel are dispatching the emergency vehicles, so there is no delay in help. Medical Dispatchers are trained to help in many ways including giving instructions on CPR and childbirth. If you have a non-emergency situation, please call the Sheriff's Dept. at 920-832-5000.

**DOG LICENSES** are due by **March 31<sup>st</sup>** to the treasurer, Erica Siewert, to avoid a late penalty. All dogs older than five months are required to be licensed. Mail proof of rabies and dog information (name, breed, color, etc.) to Town of Dale, P.O. Box 83, Dale, WI 54931. Enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope. All paperwork will be returned with the new dog tag. Payment can also be placed in the Town's Drop box. Spayed or Neutered licenses cost \$5.00. Unspayed or unneutered licenses cost \$10.00. It is very important to license your dog in case of a biting incident or to return a lost dog to its owner. Residents are reminded that dogs must be on leashes or under the control of their owners at all times.



### Mailing Addresses for Town of Dale Residents

Residents in the Town of Dale can have one of four different mailing addresses. If you have a Post Office Box at the Dale Post Office, your mailing address will be Dale, WI 54931. The other three mailing addresses will be Fremont, WI 54940, Larsen, WI 54947 or Hortonville, WI 54944. These addresses are due to the rural routes coming from one of these post offices.

Regardless of which mailing address you have, you are still a resident of the Town of Dale.

**CONSTABLE'S CORNER**

Autumn is a beautiful time of the year. It's a time of change. The rich colors of the changing trees radiate a warm feeling. A very difficult feeling enters the heart when the autumn of a pet's life is at hand. The feeling is especially heart rendering if the pet is in pain or no longer has an enjoyable quality of life. Even more difficult is a young pet suffering from an incurable disease. In some cases the pet is suffering from a disease or injury that an owner cannot afford to treat.

Those of us who are animal lovers understand the bond one can have with a pet. Pets love us unconditionally and they enrich our lives. Yet there is also a cost to pet ownership, not only financial but emotional. Most of us feel compelled to do all that we can for our pet and to do the right thing. The right thing, as hard as it may be, often is euthanasia.

When have we done enough? Where does it end? And how can we find the strength to end a life? Sometimes, we are emotionally involved that we do not see the changes in our pet's health or condition. The decision to end a pet's life should not be about the owner. It is not about our heartache or loss. The decision should be made for the good of the pet.

Ending a pet's life is not a new experience for me, but that is not to say that it becomes easier. Recently, I had to make the decision about my beautiful 16 year old Himalayan cat, Chessie. For the last year she has been ailing sleeping more, not always hitting the litter box, and walking was slowly and painfully, despite pain medication. Luckily for me (a very selfish thought), she had a seizure and then another one. I felt she was giving me a sign. She was no longer enjoying life. The dignity of her life was gone.

Somehow I found the strength to make an appointment. The veterinarian was very understanding. I asked him, "Why can't my pets just die naturally, so we don't have to make these difficult decisions?" The kind soul made me smile when he told how elated he was when his own cat died naturally the evening before his family had planned to put her down. The veterinarian went through all the possible options for treatments before we discussed ending her life. It took courage to make the decision. I was very fortunate to have my adult daughter with me to help make the decision and stay with Chessie as the painless procedure was carried out. Her limp body, wrapped in a blanket, was carried out to our vehicle in the gentle veterinarian's arms. Chessie is now "pushing daisies" and at peace.

As difficult as the decision to euthanize is, I feel very fortunate that we have a choice at the end of a pet's life. As the leaves change into fall colors, they remind me that change is part of life and who knows, as Town Constable maybe a change will come sooner than I expect with a catch of a homeless pet, much to my husband's dismay!

## RECYCLING

Outagamie County Division of Public Works contracts the recycling company. If you have a problem with your recycling not being picked up please contact Inland Service Corporation at (920)759-0501. If you still have problems contact Outagamie County at (920)832-4711. All recycling should be placed on the curb no later than 6:00 a.m. the day of pickup. A home recycling kit can be obtained from Outagamie County. Collection of recyclable materials begins at 6:30 a.m. Recyclable plastic, glass, tin, paper and aluminum can be placed curbside mixed together in a reusable container. Please rinse all of your containers! Reusable containers must be between 15 and 33 gallons in size with handles on the outside of them and weigh less than 50 pounds when set at the curb. Containers must also be marked with an Outagamie County Recycling Sticker. Latex paint can be solidified and placed in your curbside trash. Check out the county website for great information. It can be found at <http://www.co.outagamie.wi.us/sw/mainpage.html>. You can also find information on electronic recycling, the Household Hazardous Waste Clean Sweep Program dates and schedule an appointment for drop-offs. Residents are reminded that certain papers are not recyclable: 1) paper contaminated by food 2) wax-coated paper or wax-coated cardboard 3) gift-wrap 4) tissue products. The Outagamie County Dept. of Solid Waste Landfill and Materials Recycling facility will be closed on all major holidays.
